1. For general support of this organization, which seeks to strengthen democracy and promote human rights and social and economic justice in Israel. (\$381,500)
2. For *Shatil: The New Israel Fund's Empowerment & Training Center for Social Change Organizations*, which provides consulting, training, workshops and other capacity-building and coalition-coordinating services to more than a thousand social change organizations networks and activists, working to strengthen Israeli democracy and advance tolerance and equality for all Israelis.
